Making Sense of Family Separation: Taiwanese Immigrants in the US and their Aging Parents back Home

This research examines the role that various transnational connections play in molding the beliefs and practices of globally dispersed family members. I use transnational elder care as an example to illustrate how social actors articulate their understanding of gender, race/ethnicity, and social class in a cross-border familial network. I have published three articles from this project: "Fashioning Reciprocal Norms of Elder Care: A Case of Immigrants in the U.S. and their Parents in Taiwan," was published in the *Journal of Family Issues*; "Rethinking Migrant Families From a Transnational Perspective: Experiences of Parents and Their Children," was published in *Sociology Compass*; and a third piece from this project was published in the *Journal of Ethnic and Migration Studies*.
